## CONFERENCE AND SHOW GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP

#### LOVE COURSE

The Love Course at Barefoot Resort is a traditional course with a Lowcountry character and incorporates Davis Love, III's Carolina golfing experiences in the design. This visually striking course features course generous landing areas and greens complexes similar to those found on Pinehurst #2 at the 1999 U.S. Open. The Love Course is a Par 72 and plays over 7,000 yards. The course will challenge the good player, yet provide playability and enjoyment for the average player.

Tee and fairways consist of GN-1, which is a hybrid turf developed by Greg Norman Turf. The approach areas consist of Tif-sport Bermuda grass. The greens surfaces are newly acquired Champion UltraDwarf and the rough areas are 419 Bermuda grass.

#### **NORMAN COURSE**

Seven holes along the Intracoastal Waterway highlight the Norman course. Framed by the site's original vegetation, each hole enhances the beauty of its natural vistas. Combined with open green complexes and fairways running up to the sand, the Norman course presents a stunning challenge for any golfer. Norman's philosophy here is to bring into play the "bump and run" shots around the greens. Tees and fairways consist of GN-1, which is hybrid turf developed by Greg Norman Turf. The approach areas are TifDwarf and greens surfaces consist of Champion Ultradwarf Grass.



#### **FAZIO COURSE**

Like many European courses, the Fazio course does not return to the clubhouse after nine holes. Still it is not a British linksland course, but rather a classic Lowcountry course, filled with live oaks, pines, sand, natural areas and native grasses. Waste areas and formal bunkers provide visual and strategic effect, while natural elevation changes add drama and excitement. Water features can be seen on 15 holes, yet many lakes are in outof-play areas to ensure playability. Tees and Fairways are covered with GN-1 and approaches are TifSport Bermudagrass. Greens are Champion Ultradwarf Grass and the roughs are 419 Bermudagrass.

\*Four Ball teams sign up with one partner on registration form. If you would like to play in four ball, and do not have a partner, the Carolinas GCSA will assign a partner.

\*\*Captain's Choice teams may sign up with ONE partner on the registration form. If you would like to play Captain's Choice, you do NOT have to sign up with a partner, this is just an option.

## **TOURNAMENT FORMATS**

#### MEDAL PLAY

- This is a stroke play individual 18-hole golf event.
- Each contestant will play his or her own ball out on each hole and report their score.
- There will be two flights divided by handicap once field is set.

#### SENIOR MEDAL PLAY

This is identical to the Medal Play with these exceptions: Only contestants over age 50 are eligible; only 1st place gross and net will be awarded in this flight.

#### FOUR BALL

- This is a two person team event.
- Both players will complete the hole and then select the better of their scores to report for their score on each of the 18 holes.
- There will be two flights divided by combined team handicap once field is set.
- Each team will play alongside another team selected by the Carolinas GCSA.

#### CAPTAIN'S CHOICE

- This is a four person team event.
- Two contestants will be allowed to register together, and your other two players will be paired with you by the Carolinas GCSA.
- All four players will execute their desired shot from the teeing ground, then select the best respective shot, and repeat that process until the ball is holed.
- Only one team score per hole will be counted.
- There will be two flights divided by combined team handicap once field is set.

LOCATION: The Tournament will be played at Barefoot Resort - Love Course, Norman Course & Fazio Course.

**GOLF ENTRY FEE:** Member - \$110 by October 19, \$135 after October 19. Non-member - \$135 by October 19, \$150 after October 19. (Per Player) Entry fee includes green fee, cart fee, prizes and reception.

## **MICHAEL K. FABRIZIO, CGCS**



ife's turning points aren't always signposted. No one could have predicted nearly 40 years in golf was ahead when he followed a high school girlfriend from Virginia to North Carolina in 1976. Her father, Bud Nelson, had taken a new job as general manager at Connestee Falls Golf Club in Brevard. Fabrizio even helped them

move. But by the time he crossed back over the VA border, he thought he'd seen the last of the family. Then his girlfriend called to say her dad could get him a job at the country club.

At the time, the future was a vague concept for the teenaged Fabrizio. As a senior, he was working part-time as an assistant foreman for Doubleday Publications earning \$7.50 an hour. That was decent money for a kid back then. The bump to \$9 an hour he was looking at on graduation was better still. Beyond that, he really had no clear plans. So even though the offer of work as a cart attendant would only pay \$2.10 an hour, there were the fringe benefits of remaining a boyfriend, so he said yes.

This summer, the Carolinas GCSA bestowed its highest honor, the Distinguished Service Award, on the man that kid-with-acrush became - Mike Fabrizio, CGCS director of grounds and golf course maintenance for two courses at Daniel Island Club in Charleston, SC. "I am extremely humbled and honored," Fabrizio says. "The award caught me completely off guard. I guess it means I'm an old fart now!"

At 56, that's subjective. What's not in doubt is Fabrizio's worthiness. The caliber of his service over 15 years on the board of directors across two-terms, including one that saw him become president in 1994, played a significant role in the fact that today the Carolinas GCSA boasts 1,800 members and an annual operating budget close to \$1.2 million.

It was when he was president that the association made one of the most ambitious decisions in its history. Conference and Trade Show was beginning to outgrow the confines of the hotel venues in Myrtle Beach including the Hilton and the old Radisson. The Myrtle Beach Convention Center was the logical next step but the Landscape Expo held that territory with a non-compete clause. In fact, the landscapers wanted the superintendents to come on board to make an allinclusive show.

"But we wanted our event to remain golf course maintenance only and the only way we could see to do that and still continue to grow was to take them on head-on," Fabrizio says. "So we changed the dates of our show to be in direct competition and by the third year they were gone." The Carolinas GCSA Conference and Trade Show is now the largest regional event of its kind in the country.

During his second term, the board successfully negotiated a smooth transition between the association's first full-time executive director, Chuck Borman, and current leader, Tim Kreger. Successions are often fraught with difficulty but with the clear and open collaboration of all parties, Borman mentored his successor and today remains in a part-time role as finance officer.

Along the way and since, Fabrizio has established a peerless reputation as a manager of golf course terrain and the people who prepare it for play each day. He oversaw new course constructions with some of the biggest names in golf course design – Jack Nicklaus, Tom Fazio, Rees Jones, Arthur Hills. He also worked with and was close friends with another in the late Mike Strantz.

The list of those who have worked for Fabrizio who later became superintendents or went on to successful green industry careers runs into the dozens. He has been instrumental in Daniel Island Club, one of the most prestigious in the region and a three-time host of the now Web.com Tour Championship for three years, playing host to multiple Carolinas GCSA events since opening in 2000. He served on several committees for the Golf Course Superintendents Association of America in the '80s and '90s.

"I never had the privilege to work for Mike but I have had the privilege of working in the same area as him," says Carolinas GCSA director, Rob Daniel, CGCS who made the formal nomination. "The consensus amongst a lot of guys in this area is that none of us would be where we are in our careers without his help or influence."

Mike Fabrizio will receive the Distinguished Service Award at this year's Conference and Trade Show in Myrtle Beach and later will be special guest of honor at a dinner for all previous winners of the award.

## **O1** Developing Comprehensive Herbicide Programs for Weed Management

Fred H. Yelverton, Ph.D., Professor of Crop Science, NC State University Travis Gannon, Ph.D., Assistant Professor of Crop Science, NC State University

Effective weed management is a continuous challenge for golf course superintendents. This seminar will include contemporary as well as traditional approaches to develop comprehensive programs for common and troublesome weeds on the golf course. This seminar will also focus on new herbicides and devising comprehensive weed management plans.









## **102** Dealing with Bugs & Crud Affecting **NEW** Cool-Season Turfgrass Golf Courses

*Rick Brandenburg, Ph.D., Turfgrass Entomologist, NC State University Jim Kerns, Ph.D., Turfgrass Plant Pathologist, NC State University* 

This half-day course will address the site specific problems associated with insect and disease management on coolseason grasses. Cost effective strategies to manage these pests change rapidly as new turf cultivars and cultural management strategies are employed, new pest problems emerge, and new products are registered. This course focuses on rapidly bringing turf managers up to speed on the latest pest information, new concepts for pest management, and the adoption and use of new pesticides. Included in the course will be identification and diagnosis of traditional insect and disease problems as well as new and emerging pest problems, discussions of the impact of environmental and cultural practices on pest abundance, and concepts for the development and use integrated pest management strategies.



## **103** Understanding Turfgrass Fungicides

Rick Latin, Ph.D., Professor of Turfgrass Pathology, Purdue University

This seminar deals with how and why fungicides work (or why, in some cases, they do not work). We will discuss how fungicides move within turf plants, how different fungicides target pathogenic fungi, and how disease pressure influences fungicide performance. Other topics include fungicide resistance and depletion of fungicides from turf. For each topic, we will review current research and discuss why this is important in terms fungicide selection and application scheduling. Although most turf fungicide research involves cool season grasses, concepts also apply to chemical control of diseases on bermudagrass. We will use real world examples to address the principles of fungicide action. The idea is that if you understand how and why fungicides work, then you will be able to make disease control decisions from a more informed perspective. Furthermore, I believe a more comprehensive knowledge of fungicides will help prepare you to communicate disease control issues with golf patrons, greens committees, and the general public. This is not a review of the efficacy of all fungicides against turf diseases, but specific concerns can be addressed in the general discussion. I use a novel presentation technology that facilitates discussion of important topics and allows all of us to interact (anonymously).



## **109** Understanding Factors that Affect **NEW** Pesticide Fate and Behavior

Pesticides are commonly used to manage weeds, insects, and diseases on the golf course. Occasionally, pesticides move off-target damaging non-target plants or may not be efficacious. 




