> Love Course

The Love Course at Barefoot Resort is a traditional course with a Lowcountry character and incorporates Davis Love, Ill's Carolina golfing experiences in the design. This visually striking course features course generous landing areas and greens complexes similar to those found on Pinehurst #2 at the 1999 U.S. Open. The Love Course is a Par 72 and plays over 7,000 yards. The course will challenge the good player, yet provide playability and enjoyment for the average player.

Tee and fairways consist of GN-1, which is a hybrid turf developed by Greg Norman Turf. The approach areas consist of Tif-sport Bermuda grass. The greens surfaces are newly acquired Champion UltraDwarf and the rough areas are 419 Bermuda grass.



> Norman Course

Seven holes along the Intracoastal Waterway highlight the Norman course. Framed by the site's original vegetation, each hole enhances the beauty of its natural vistas. Combined with open green complexes and fairways running up to the sand, the Norman course presents a stunning challenge for any golfer. Norman's philosophy here is to bring into play the "bump and run" shots around the greens. Tees and fairways consist of GN-1, which is hybrid turf developed by Greg Norman Turf. The approach areas are TifDwarf and greens surfaces consist of Champion Ultradwarf Grass.



> Fazio Course

Like many European courses, the Fazio course does not return to the clubhouse after nine holes. Still it is not a British linksland course, but rather a classic Lowcountry course, filled with live oaks, pines, sand, natural areas and native grasses. Waste areas and formal bunkers provide visual and strategic effect, while natural elevation changes add drama and excitement. Water features can be seen on 15 holes, yet many lakes are in out-of-play areas to ensure playability. Tees and Fairways are covered with GN-1 and approaches are TifSport Bermudagrass. Greens are Champion Ultradwarf Grass and the roughs are 419 Bermudagrass.

Golf Championship General Rules



> Eligibility

Players must be registered to attend or participate in the Carolinas Golf Course Superintendents Conference & Show. Superintendents and affiliates will play in mixed foursomes. Contestants will select to play in Medal Play, Senior Medal Play, Four Ball*, or Captains Choice** Division.

*Four Ball teams sign up with one partner on registration form. If you would like to play in four ball, and do not have a partner, the Carolinas GCSA will assign a partner.

**Captain's Choice teams may sign up with ONE partner on the registration form. If you would like to play Captain's Choice, you do NOT have to sign up with a partner, this is just an option.

> Tournament Formats

MEDAL PLAY

- This is a stroke play individual 18-hole golf event.
- Each contestant will play his or her own ball out on each hole and report their score.
- There will be two flights divided by handicap once field is set.

SENIOR MEDAL PLAY

This is identical to the Medal Play with these exceptions: Only contestants over age 50 are eligible; only 1st place gross and net will be awarded in this flight.

FOUR BALL

- This is a two person team event.
- Both players will complete the hole and then select the better of their scores to report for their score on each of the 18 holes.
- There will be two flights divided by combined team handicap once field is set.
- Each team will play alongside another team selected by the Carolinas GCSA.

CAPTAIN'S CHOICE

- This is a four person team event.
- Two contestants will be allowed to register together, and your other two players will be paired with you by the Carolinas GCSA.
- All four players will execute their desired shot from the teeing ground, then select the best respective shot, and repeat that process until the ball is holed.
- Only one team score per hole will be counted.
- There will be two flights divided by combined team handicap once field is set.

LOCATION: The Tournament will be played at Barefoot Resort - Love Course, Norman Course & Fazio Course.

GOLF ENTRY FEE: Member - \$100 by October 18, \$115 after October 18. Non-member - \$125 by October 18, \$140 after October 18 (Per Player) Entry fee includes green fee, cart fee, prizes and reception.

ENTRY DEADLINE: First 300 players will be accepted. No entries will be accepted after the first 300 players or November 3, 2014, no exceptions.

CANCELLATION POLICY: First 300 players will be accepted. No entries will be accepted after the first 300 players or November 2, 2015, no exceptions.



Distinguished Service Award 2015



> Steve Sheets



The road to the top is often long and winding but rarely is that so literally true as it was for Steve Sheets. In 1984, Sheets drove 342 miles negotiating switchbacks and hairpin curves as he climbed the last of almost 5,000 feet to arrive at Linville Ridge Country Club. Until then he was golf course superintendent at Belvedere Plantation in Hampstead on the North Carolina coast. Now he was going

from sea level to caring for the highest golfing terrain east of the Mississippi River.

There can be no greater contrast in climate and growing conditions in the state. To make it work, Sheets says he unashamedly picked the brains of two veterans of mountain golf, Ernie Hayes and Aylor Rogers. "Relationships are everything," Sheets says, and he has built many over nearly 50 years in and around golf course maintenance. "That's the thing about what we do in this business. Everyone is always willing to help their fellow superintendent."

That applies to Sheets himself and is a significant factor in why he will receive the Carolinas GCSA Distinguished Service Award at this year's Conference and Show in Myrtle Beach, SC. Sheets has given much to many over the decades, often directly, sometimes indirectly, always generously. He has helped groom successful superintendents, build local associations and steer the Carolinas GCSA along its current path. There are superintendents who have never met him who owe him thanks all the same.

T. (Thomas) Stephen Sheets grew up in Asheboro, NC and was often at the golf course while his father played. At 15 he took a summer job on the golf course maintenance staff at Uwharrie Country Club. His father would drop him off in the morning then pick him up after work. Often they would play some golf before heading home. A passion was born but the marriage to the profession didn't come until after Sheets spent several years wondering what he wanted to be.

Two years at Wingate College didn't bring much clarity so he signed on to the fledgling turfgrass program at North Carolina State University under the likes of Drs. Bill Gilbert, Carl Blake and Leon Lucas. All through school, both high school and

college, he'd worked on golf courses, Uwharrie and Pinewood Country Club. But even upon graduation his career path was unclear and he moved to Louisiana to work for a surveying company for nine months.

He returned to Asheboro and soon earned the assistant superintendent position under Bernie Greene on the South course at Whispering Pines in the North Carolina Sandhills. Barely a year later, at the tender age of 23, Sheets was the golf course superintendent at Belvedere. He may have been greener than the grass he was growing but he did well enough to spend seven and half years at Belvedere before fate intervened.

Arl Greene Jr., who was superintendent at Linville Ridge, died in the fall of 1983. Greene was the brother of Bernie Greene and father of Carolinas GCSA past-president John Greene. Although he didn't know it at the time, Sheets had gained the beginnings of a toehold in the mountains when he worked for Bernie Greene at Whispering Pines. He interviewed for the job at Linville Ridge early in '84 and has been there ever since.

Today, he is director of golf course maintenance, development and operations. If the title is a mouthful, the job is a handful. Sheets oversees not just the golf course but also POA, landscape maintenance, and all new projects undertaken by the development which spans 1,800 acres and has 384 homes and condos. The course, which is open from May 1 to October 31, sees about 10,000 rounds each year. At Sheets' behest, Linville Ridge has hosted a number of Carolinas GCSA fall meetings.

Along the way, Sheets became probably the only person to serve as president of both the Eastern North Carolina Turfgrass Association and the Western North Carolina Turfgrass Association. He was the last to serve two years as president of the Carolinas GCSA, 1992-93. During his presidency he transformed Carolinas Green from a "flimsy, pale green pamphlet" into a genuine magazine. It was part of a broader push by the Carolinas GCSA to enhance the image and perception of the superintendent.

With the new-look magazine and a dedicated Superintendent Image Campaign – which survives today – the goal, as Sheets wrote in his president's message then, was to give the golfing public and the wider community access to "proper information, not hearsay." "We have acquired more responsibility as each year passes and we have been thrust into the limelight as public awareness over environmental issues has increased," he wrote – in 1992.

Groundwork laid then by Steve Sheets and others like him since is the very foundation on which the success of today's Carolinas GCSA sits. Distinguished service indeed

AO1 Optimize Soil Health to Enhance Turf **NEW** Growth and Quality

Cale A. Bigelow, Ph.D., Professor of Agronomy, Purdue University Dara Park, Ph.D., Assistant Professor Turfgrass Soil & Water, Clemson University

Explore the variety of amendments that increase the biological, chemical, and physical functionality of soil. Learn how traditional and non-traditional soil amendments are used to overcome soil challenges, promoting the optimal soil environment for turfgrass growth and quality. Compare relative costs, environmental concerns, and the sustainability of using specific soil amendments. Study root stimulants, microbial community stimulants, water and air movement, increasing cation exchange capacity, saline and sodic soils and high bicarbonates. After this seminar you will:

- Understand soil health and how soil amendments may assist with increasing it
- Know the differences between organic and inorganic amendments
- Identify specific challenges and soil amendments used to overcome those challenges
- Access whether soil amendments should be incorporated into your turfgrass management plans by evaluating soil biological, physical and chemical qualities and turfgrass quality.
- Evaluate soil and water tests and determine soil amendments for increasing nutrient retention, CEC, management of sodium, salinity, bicarbonates and soils irrigated with pure water.






102 Understanding Factors that Affect **NEW** Pesticide Fate and Behavior

Travis Gannon, Ph.D., Assistant Professor of Crop Science, NC State University

Pesticides are commonly used to manage weeds, insects, and diseases on the golf course. Occasionally, pesticides move off-target damaging non-target plants or may not be efficacious. In other scenarios, herbicides may cause adverse injury to the desired turf. Understanding the biological and chemical attributes of pesticides and how they behave after application may increase pest control while minimizing off-target movement and injury. Seminar discussions will focus on specific examples of off-target injury and failed herbicide applications. Overall, participants will have a better understanding of pesticide fate and behavior and will be able to devise best management practices to minimize off-target pesticide injury and maximize pest control.


403 Advanced Weed Management

Bert McCarty, Ph.D., Professor of Turfgrass Science, Clemson University

This workshop integrates weed life cycles, environmental factors affecting weed growth and occurrence, identification, and chemical and cultural control in developing a holistic weed management program. All major warm- and coolseason weeds will be presented and discussed, along with parameters influencing pesticide performance, fate, potential herbicide resistance, and plant growth regulator use. A general knowledge of turf culture and experience in pesticide application are required for maximum benefit.

104 Turning Your Golf Course Green **Using Turf Colorants**

Grady Miller, Ph.D., Professor and Extension Specialist, Turfgrass Science, NC State University

This seminar will provide an overview of using turf colorants along with specific research results and practical experiences using many of the commercially available products. The presentation will include performance of products along with a basic economic analysis. Application techniques with information about nozzles, carrier volumes, rates, and equipment will be discussed. Upon completion attendees will be familiar with colorant options, understand the differences in products, understand the varying effects of rates & dilutions and understand the limitations of using these products. Attendees will hear from a researcher and a passionate superintendent that is very experienced with using these products.

Major diseases of bentgrass will be profiled and environmental effects promoting them will be discussed. Diseases in mountain environments will be emphasized as well as those limiting bentgrass survival in heat stress environments.

106 Managing Annual Bluegrass Weevils

Patricia J. Vittum Ph.D., Professor of Turf Entomology, University of Massachusetts - Amherst

The annual bluegrass weevil has long been a major pest of golf courses in the Northeast, but recently has become established in parts of the Carolinas. This seminar will include information on the life cycle of the insect, cultural conditions that favor its activity, and the most current chemical control strategies that provide good control of the insect. The seminar will also describe the potential for development of resistance to pyrethroids, and specific suggestions for reducing the likelihood the resistance will develop in a given location.
