DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

2026 PAUL JETT, CGCS



When Paul Jett, CGCSA walked out of his first Carolinas GCSA board meeting somewhere close to midnight back in January of 2002, he wondered whether service was such a good idea after all. The meeting started at “3 or 4 and was supposed to wrap up about 6 or 7 then we’d go to dinner,” he recalls. “Well, 6 or 7 came and went and about 9 o’clock we ordered food in. I don’t even remember what we talked about. But I do remember thinking, ‘Oh, my God. What have I gotten myself into.’”

Elite company as it turns out.

This November 18, for exemplary service to his profession and his association, Jett will become just the 38th recipient of the Carolinas GCSA’s highest honor, the Distinguished Service Award.

Much of that service came over his decade spent as a board member, a decade as significant as any in the history of the association.

The 2000s were anything but easy. Early in the decade, the tech bubble burst and terrorists attacked on September 11, 2001. Closer to home, the region endured crippling drought in middle part of the decade, and golf looked like losing access to water. Then in 2008 came the Great Recession, casting a cloud – or worse – over virtually every walk of life.

Against that backdrop, and despite of it, the Carolinas GCSA went from strength to strength. The association hired a professional lobbyist and led a new golf industry coalition that made a stamp in both Raleigh, NC and Columbia, SC. It fought off a potentially harmful new tax on golf, promoted the industry’s economic impact and helped preserve the game’s access to water.

Jett, along with a host of others – some of whom have also been honored with the DSA – played an integral role in all of it. As he did when, in 2008, the Carolinas GCSA became the first GCSAA affiliated chapter to own its own headquarters, a fully refurbished 2,200 sq. ft. building in Liberty, SC. He was even there before opening day helping unload furniture.

The following year, his year as president, the association launched an online auction of tee times to raise money for turfgrass research. That program has long since gone



national, this year yielding a record \$936,298.

“It’s hard to believe that it’s been 17 years since we launched Rounds 4 Research,” says Jett, who drove, phoned and emailed his way across the Carolinas convincing peers to get on board. In that launch year, his year as president, he spoke – in person – at meetings of 11 of the then 12 local associations. In 2010, he helped instigate the Virginia Cup, an annual challenge match between the best golfers from the Carolinas GCSA and Virginia GCSA.

He did all that while holding down a day job – at Pinehurst No. 2 – where he hosted two U.S. Open Championships – in 1999 and 2005. Each year, he presented course conditions that served like a raw steak on the bruised eye of the

USGA, on the back of course condition controversies at the Olympic Club in 1998 and Shinnecock in 2004. Payne Stewart, who won in 1999 as the only player in red figures at 1 under par, said No. 2’s conditioning was “perfect.”

Jett would also host the 2008 U.S. Amateur Championship at No. 2. It would not be his only closeup experience with national amateur golf. The next time around, he was actually in the field.

As a superintendent, he twice won the Carolinas GCSA championship and finished runner-up in GCSAA’s national championship four times. But it wasn’t until switching to a sales role with what is now Triangle Turf and Ornamental in 2010 that he was eventually able to devote real time to his game.

In 2019, he not only qualified for the U.S. Senior Amateur he made it to the quarter finals. The 2020 championship was canceled because of the pandemic but the following year he made it to the round of 32.

Jett says little if any of it would have come without the help of others including family, friends and industry colleagues. “I have had a lot of great people who have worked for me and with me,” he says. “And they should all take a little piece of this award with them because there are a lot of other people who played a role in this.”

Since opening to the public in January 1994, Caledonia Golf and Fish Club has rapidly gained a reputation as one of the premier courses in America. It is the first solo design of late, great golf course architect Mike Strantz. Strantz approached his assignments in a unique way—as an artist, rather than an engineer. His exceptionally creative eye is reflected in the way he sculpted Caledonia's 18 holes, with large, creative greens guarded at times by ponds, streams and imposing bunkers. The same sort of majestic live oak that overhang the entryway into Caledonia similarly frames many of the shots at Caledonia, giving the course a rustic feel. Thousands of annual and semiannual flowers bloom every year throughout the property, further adding to the beauty of the experience. A round of golf at Caledonia has been described as a "beautiful day in a floral nature park."

GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP GENERAL RULES



ELIGIBILITY

Players must be registered to attend or participate in the Carolinas Golf Course Superintendents Conference & Show. Superintendents and affiliates will play in mixed foursomes. Contestants will select to play in Medal Play, Senior Medal Play, Four Ball*, or Captain's Choice** Division.

**Four Ball teams sign up with one partner on registration form. If you would like to play in four ball, and do not have a partner, the Carolinas GCSA will assign a partner.*

***Captain's Choice teams may sign up with THREE partners on the registration form. If you would like to play Captain's Choice, you do NOT have to sign up with a partner, this is just an option.*

TOURNAMENT FORMATS

MEDAL PLAY

- This is a stroke play individual 18-hole golf event.
- Each contestant will play his or her own ball out on each hole and report their score.
- There will be two flights divided by handicap once field is set.

SENIOR MEDAL PLAY

This is identical to the Medal Play with these exceptions: Only contestants over age 50 are eligible; Only 1st place gross and net will be awarded in this flight; Senior players will play from forward tees except on holes designated for long drive and closest to the pin contests.

FOUR BALL

- This is a two person team event.
- Both players will complete the hole and then select the better of their scores to report for their score on each of the 18 holes.
- There will be two flights divided by combined team handicap once field is set.
- Each team will play alongside another team selected by the Carolinas GCSA.

CAPTAIN'S CHOICE

- This is a four person team event.
- All four players will execute their desired shot from the teeing ground, then select the best respective shot, and repeat that process until the ball is holed.
- Only one team score per hole will be counted.

The conversion by many golf courses to ultradwarf bermudagrass cultivars for golf greens requires the development of comprehensive management programs that integrate agronomic practices with effective pest management strategies. Agronomic topics will include construction and cultivar considerations, sunlight requirements, fertility programs, thatch/mat/OM management options, irrigation strategies, winter color and spring transition practices, and winter injury prevention. Weed management will be discussed throughout these topics, emphasizing how cultural practices can reduce weed pressure and support effective herbicide programs. Herbicide selection, application timing, and the integration of chemical and cultural weed management strategies will also be addressed.

A comprehensive understanding of fungicides will lead to better disease control decisions. This interactive seminar offers real world scenarios to explain how fungicides work, why fungicides work, and why (sometimes) they do not work.

Although this seminar will not focus on lists of diseases and fungicides, questions about specific products for turf disease control are welcome and are often addressed during the general discussion.

Specific topics include:

Getting to the Root of Soilborne Diseases - Warm Season Turfgrasses

Management of turfgrass in the transition zone presents several challenges. Warm season turfgrasses in this area may be more adapted to endure the intense summer heat, but there are numerous pests that are of constant concern for degrading turfgrass playing surfaces. This seminar will focus on those diseases that attack below the turf surface and often unseen until the root system is often severely degraded. Pathogens that attack roots, stolons and rhizomes can be particularly challenging, but attendees will gain perspective in forecasting these issues in the future and how to spot the early symptoms before it's too late. We will cover the current state of knowledge regarding the cause, epidemiology, and management of mini-ring, take all root rot, spring dead spot, and pythium root rot. We will also discuss new research examining how pathogenic nematodes may be impacting these diseases. For each disease, we will cover the current state of cultural and chemical controls so that attendees can implement these tools into their programs.

Press McPhaul

For more than a quarter-century as a college golf coach, Press McPhaul was a major figure in the lives of young men through some of their most formative years. Behind the scenes he also helped guide other coaches, as director of coaches ministry for Christian Golf Fellowship. A non-denominational Christian ministry, Christian Golf Fellowship launched in 2002 and now has about three dozen staff across the country.



A native of Sanford, NC, McPhaul retired last year after eight seasons at North Carolina State. His tenure was a fitting bookend to a college golf career that began in 1991 as part of the Wolfpack team. He participated in three NCAA Championships - 1993, 1995, 1996 - and was co-captain of the 1995-96 squad.

He later served as assistant coach before landing his first head coaching role at Vanderbilt. Before returning to Raleigh in 2017, he led Eastern Carolina for 11 years. For all the victories over that period and all the players who went on to the PGA TOUR, McPhaul operated with a broader mission.

As Christian Golf Fellowship spells out, college athletes can be "spiritually vulnerable...away from home, making their own decisions, establishing their own world-view, and experimenting with all that college life has to offer. They are bombarded with questions about life, faith, truth, purpose, philosophy, relationships, identity, morality, and spirituality. a group of people."

McPhaul will share lessons from that experience and from his faith at this year's Fellowship Breakfast, presented in partnership with NewLife Turf and Corbin Turf and Ornamental Supply on November 18.
